# INTRODUCTION



It's hard to believe that I have witnessed the growth of EarthShare Georgia for nearly half of its 25 years, and the changes have been fascinating.

Once a grassroots organization that advocated for representation in workplace-giving campaigns for state, county, and city employees to be represented as a choice in payroll donations alongside United Way, EarthShare Georgia now

plays an important role in partnering with companies to engage employees in the environment in multiple ways. Thanks to the hard work of co-founder Alice Rolls, many workplace-giving campaigns were established in the 1990s at a time when the environmental movement was beginning to gain some momentum. Her leadership provided the framework for best practices in business partnerships with such companies as The Coca-Cola Company, Kaiser Permanente and Worldspan.

The early 2000s brought the affiliation with EarthShare national, and a name change from the Environmental Fund for Georgia (still our legal name) to EarthShare Georgia, and most recently the "of" has been dropped to be more consistent with other state affiliates. When I was hired as the executive director in 2006, environmental awareness was growing, but we were still a long way from being represented in multiple workplace-giving campaigns. Today, we are proud to be included in dozens of workplace-giving campaigns both in Georgia and throughout the nation, having raised and distributed more than \$6 million to outstanding environmental and conservation organizations. While our goal is still to increase both the number of workplace-giving campaigns and the amount of funds raised to support our member groups, the change in corporate culture since the 2008 recession has had a significant impact on how business partnerships evolve. As the baby boomer generation slowly exits the traditional workplace environment, gone are the days when a simple donation to a non-profit via an workplace giving form suffices for true employee engagement in the environment.

The maturing of the millennial generation and the advances in technology over the past ten years have accelerated a demand for diverse volunteer and learning opportunities. I believe EarthShare Georgia, and the entire EarthShare network, is positioned to be the "go to" resource and connector network to provide a wide range of giving, learning and volunteering resources through the diverse and amazing non-profits we help support. Please join us on our journey as we explore new ways to improve and sustain our environment for generations to come.

# HISTORY

EarthShare Georgia was founded in 1992 by its member groups as the Environmental Fund for Georgia to represent them in workplace-giving campaigns and to provide an efficient and secure way to manage their donations. In 2001, the Environmental Fund for Georgia officially affiliated with EarthShare national to become part of a network representing more than 500 environmental groups working locally, nationally and internationally. This affiliation streamlined representation and facilitated the ability to meet the needs of multi-state employers to organize a single campaign under one name, EarthShare. It also brought with it the fundraising power of the EarthShare network which has raised more than \$350 million for the environment.



## Fall TEAM UP TO GREEN UP VOLUNTEER DAY

The Fall Team Up to Green Up Volunteer Day began in 2015 as a way to provide an additional employee engagement opportunity for companies to work in underserved communities.

Over the past three years, projects have included a clean-up along Proctor Creek; improvements at Mattie Freeland Park in West Atlanta; and weeding, mulching, and planting at the Brown's Mill Food Forest in South Atlanta.

These projects have brought together a variety of local community members and partner organizations with EarthShare Georgia staff and over 200 volunteers for meaningful and productive work, further connecting our corporate partners with the environment and the initiatives of our member groups.

# Corporate GREEN DAY Challenge

## EARTH DAY VOLUNTEER EVENT

The Corporate Green Day Challenge is an annual competitive event that matches company teams to environmental organizations for a day of significant environmental improvement in April as part of EarthShare Georgia's Earth Day celebration. The winning company team receives an award at the annual Earth Day Leadership Breakfast based on project accomplishment, leadership, organization and project sustainability.

From 2004 to 2018, more than 8,500 volunteers spent 5,000 volunteer hours trading their ties and suits for garden gloves and boots to help collect trash and recycling, clean up parks and streams, plant countless seeds, and create new trails.

# Select Member Group Accomplishments

EarthShare Georgia supports its member groups in their shared missions to accomplish great things for Georgia's environment.

*The following is a sample of accomplishments since joining EarthShare Georgia:*

**The Atlanta Audubon Society** has certified 500 properties across metro Atlanta as Wildlife Sanctuaries, reached 100 educators through their 50-hour "Taking Wing" continuing education program and offered more than 1,000 free birdwatching field trips in and around Atlanta.



**The Chattahoochee Nature Center** has engaged over 580,000 students from metro Atlanta schools through their programming, helped close to 700,000 visitors connect with nature, coordinated River Canoe Adventures for approximately 5,000 people where participants learn about the importance of the Chattahoochee River Watershed, and harvested 62,000 pounds of produce from their quarter-acre Unity Garden. This produce was donated to North Fulton Community Charities' food pantry.

In **Chattahoochee Riverkeeper's** 25 year history, together with partners, sponsors and dedicated volunteers, they have removed more than two million pounds of trash – equal to 25 full 18-wheeler tractor trailers.

**Friends of Georgia State Parks & Historic Sites** has mobilized more than 40,000 volunteers and has provided an estimated 544,500 volunteer hours, valued at \$11 million, in support of Georgia's state parks and historic sites.

**The Elachee Nature Science Center** has served over 500,000 children through their school programs and summer camp, protected 99,312 linear feet of streambanks under United States Core of Engineers restrictive covenants and permanently protected 1,868 acres of greenspace since 2000.



**Flint Riverkeeper** has stopped two separate attempts to place significant dam projects in the Flint River watershed, halted two different coal-fired power plant projects, returned substantial baseflow to the upper Flint and used healing light on several major sources of pollution.

**Georgia ForestWatch** has helped protect over 50,000 acres of previously unidentified wildlands in the Chattahoochee National Forest, reduced timber sales in the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forest, led a lawsuit that halted the Forest Service's timber harvest program in 1996, helped support biocontrol research and co-initiated with the Forest Service the Collaborative Trails (CoTrails) initiative.



**Georgia Organics** has led Georgia's Farm to School Alliance and now 40 participate in farm to school activities like school gardens and taste tests of local veggies. They have helped 24 farms through the multi-year process of becoming certified organic and hosted more than 10,000 people at their annual conferences. Georgia Organics also launched Georgia Food Oasis in Augusta and Columbus to activate communities around place-based food initiatives.

# Select Member Group Accomplishments



**The Georgia River Network** has exposed 3,736 people to Paddle GA, granted \$108,000 to local river groups from Paddle GA, regranted \$210,000 through the Turner Foundation Regrant Program, and regranted \$147,500 on behalf of the Georgia Water Coalition Mott regrant program.

**The Keep Georgia Beautiful Foundation** has introduced Leaders Against Litter, a PSA campaign opportunity for Georgia's elected officials to record anti-littering messages. In the last three years, their affiliate network has worked to plant over 57,000 trees, flowers, seedlings and shrubs, created over 800 greenspaces, and collected over 3 million pounds of litter across Georgia.

**The Southern Alliance for Clean Energy** released the Solar in the Southeast 2017 Annual Report, which highlights Georgia Power as the third largest utility for solar energy in the region based on the amount of installed solar versus the total number of customers served. Their new education campaign, Electrify the South, provides information to consumers about driving electric, EV options, charging and more.



**Southface** has certified more than 48,000 green buildings through their certification program, EarthCraft. Their Grants to Green Program has helped more than 200 nonprofits save \$8 million from water and energy efficiency improvements. The NonProfit Energy and Water Efficiency Initiative has saved the Boys & Girls Club of America \$656,000.




**Park Pride** has supported 702,388 hours of volunteer service in parks and awarded 345 grants to Friends of the Park groups through their Grantmaking Program totaling more than \$6 million.

**Savannah Riverkeeper** has removed hundreds of tons of litter, with 17,000 pounds of trash removed in 2017 by over 300 volunteers at 30 events. They also led the coalition that stopped the Palmetto Pipeline.

**The Georgia Ornithological Society** has promoted the protection of over 10,000 acres of ecologically critical land benefitting state and federally threatened bird species, contributed over \$500,000 toward graduate and undergraduate student research grants and financially supported hundreds of young birders at various ornithology-oriented camps.
